When we train our dogs as puppies we instill in them at early age obedience and house rules and establish us as owners to be the alpha. Training at an early age is so important, and animals never forget what they have learned in the first six weeks of life.

We fail to remember the adolescence stage when our dogs begin to get more independent. Hormones bring on sexual development and that is why neutering and spaying our dogs is so important by six months of age. Along with physical change these changes will

continue until 18 months to two years.

Adolescence is a time when people sometimes give up, unnecessarily on their pets. Animal shelters receive countless "problem" pets that are really developing normally and require a little extra patience. But if you bear in mind that it is only a state, this time can bring you closer to your pet.

In adolescence, pets become more aware and interested in the larger world around them. Many of the behaviors of puppyhood, such as chewing and jumping up, are still present and pets begin testing the limits of house rules.

Provide positive opportunities such as games and walking and reward positive behavior with praise and extra attention. Redirect potential negative behavior by anticipating and preventing mishaps. Sometimes simple solutions, such as spraying a chewing deterrent on furniture, such as bitter apple, go a long way. Don't forget the use of a crate for a few hours, though daylong crating should be discouraged.

Shelter professionals agree that adopting these bundles of energy bring many advantages. You'll have a head start on housebreaking and you are able to see first hand a true picture of your pet's eventual temperament.

The blissful time of puppyhood is brief. Adolescence intrudes for a while, as most dogs don't settle down until they are three years old. Have faith in your adolescent pet - the best is yet to come.

Breed of the Month The Canaan Dog

The Canaan Dog Founders, Drs. Rudolphina and Rudolph Menzel settled in Palestine in 1935 and their task was to establish a service-dog system.

They were intrigued by a shy, neglected, half-wild animal which they learned to love. With Domestication the dog's desire for human attachment was satisfied and they learned that a person could mean well toward them and be trusted.

The menzels directed the breeding of these dogs to keep their originality, resistance to disease and climate and preserve the traits of these feral creatures and their valuable characteristics.

The name Canaan identifies them as the "ancient Inhabitants" of Israel as were the Canaanites who lived there

3,000 years ago. Their characteristics include a heart-stopping graceful gait, are territorial in their behavior, their physical endurance is high and the dogs' tracking drive is middle to high. It is a born watch dog and has been used for herding without any training. They have sharp senses of hearing and smell, tolerate heat well, and require minimal amounts of food and grooming.

On September 7, 1965 the first imports reached American soil and went to Mr. & Mrs. Jay Sheaffer of Emmaus, PA who are largely responsible for perpetuating the breed in this country.


The conformation of this dog corresponds to that of a herding and flock guardian dog. IT is reserved with strangers but affectionate, responsive, and loving with its family.

It is a breed that represents a group of dogs that has held on to certain characteristic traits while living in the wild state and yet ready to live in close association with people and serve them.

No health problems are significant to the breed at this time. They are content in an apartment or on a farm. A Canaan Dog will adopt to almost any family situation. This dog is eager to please but also needs to know the rules of the house, otherwise it can become manipulative.

This breed is natural and unique with an unusual history. Its time has come to make a paw print in the annals of dogdom.

One of the greatest secrets of life is having patience & wisdom... Knowing when to do what, kinda like the song says, 'you gotta know when to hold em... Know when to fold em'.

On Saturday September 6, we will be attending the PA Pet Fund raiser at the Shikellamy State Park. Our stand will be set up starting at 9:00 am with information literature and we will be testing for the GC/TDI test. If anyone could help that day I would appreciate it.

Don't forget our Dog Picnic which will be held Sunday, September 28 at Pavilion 2 at the Shikellamy Marina starting at 1:00 pm. We will be there rain or shine. Our club supplies the hot dogs and soda and we ask everyone to bring a covered dish and utensils. We always have a Chinese Auction and ask you to bring a gift for a dog or dog related item. 
