Dogs are masters at reading body language and understanding facial expression. They recognize fury from the stance, angry look, and tone of voice, but they cannot understand the raging word.

Be sure to reward your dog for good behavior, if using treats, a toy or just praise and affection. This is the way dogs learn what they are doing right better than discipline for what they are doing wrong.

Our Club has come a long way in training our dogs in all kinds of situations. We never know when a certain condition will cause our dogs fear or excitement so we must prepare them for all levels of activity.

Every dog learns at different levels and over the years personalities can change. By coming to class we can keep these activities in check.

Breed of the Month Australian Terrier

When you read about Australian Terriers, you hear about brave hunting dogs, but they are really one of the more gentle Terriers and some of the easiest to train. What you don't hear is that they were also bred to be companions.

Confident, adaptable and affectionate, Australian Terriers likely descended from Yorkshire, Skye, Manchester and Cairn. Early British settlers took these dogs to Australia where the Australian Terrier was developed. In the mid-19th Century they were bred to herd sheep, serve as watchdogs, and control rodents in mines, at the waterfront, and



on farms. The breed's undercoat keeps the dogs warm and the rough outercoat repels dirt, grass and brambles.

Today, this well-loved family dog retains the personality and good looks of its ancestors. They are very low-maintenance dogs that just go with the flow and are willing to please and are slightly less independent than the typical terrier.

The breed requires little grooming, adapts to whatever exercise an owner provides, and rarely has serious health problems because of small numbers and careful breeding.

In addition to conformation, the breed takes to obedience, agility and Earthdog trials.

First shown in its native country in 1899, the Australian Terrier came to the United States in the 1940's.

Happiest at home surrounded by adoring humans, this energetic Terrier will dig and hunt small animals, such as squirrels, rabbits and cats when opportunity arises. But its perky ears and dark, lively eyes make it tough to resist and with owners wanting to own more than one.
