Keep your dog healthy and happy this season with a few tips for managing the holidays.

With all the preparation which this season brings, first and foremost we must not forget to give our dogs daily exercise. When your dog misses his daily walk or some play time he has far good reason to get into trouble.

Your obedience skills can be put to good work so your dog should be well-versed in sit, stay, down, leave it, and a place cue for a mat or crate. Teaching your dog basic manners makes you happier, makes your visitors happier, and ultimately makes the dog happier. Training will improve your dog's emotional and physical life. It can also save his life.

Another factor for the holiday is to gauge your dog's stress level. Any change in the household: guests, new smells, decorations, the changing of your furniture can all be stressful for your dog. They need a quiet place away from a lot of activity and a crate with a frozen nyla bone filled with peanut butter helps them relax and gives you time to attend to holiday preparation.

A few suggestions in keeping your dog safe during the holidays are:

Resist furry family members begging for holiday treats from the table. Rich foods can upset your pet's stomach or cause pancreatitis. Chocolate, alcohol, onions, raisins and grapes can cause serious illness.

Place holiday plants out of reach of pets. Some may be harmful or even poisonous.

Store trash away from animals after holiday meals. Poultry bones can cause internal damage if swallowed.

Breed of the Month Irish Red and White Setter submitted by Connie Cuff

The friendly Red and White has a charming enthusiasm for life and is a wonderful family dog who does great with children of most ages. Children should be a little older as this rambunctious dog could have too much energy for toddlers

Like all of the setter breeds, Red and Whites need abundant exercise, namely free-running opportunities every day. The breed maintains a high level of energy and 'puppyhood' long after other breeds have made the couch their favorite spot in the house. They excel at hunting, agility, tracking, obedience and the conformation ring.



Before bringing home an Irish Red and White, decide if you have the time and willingness to provide a daily outlet for his energy. They are beautiful dogs And wonderful companions if you are going to make them part of your family and everyday activities.

Although the Irish Red and White shares his roots with his red-coated cousin, the Irish Setter, they are separate breeds.

Both breeds were developed in Ireland and documented as far back as the 1600s. Although many historians believe the Irish Red and White came first, the solid-red Irish Setter became more popular with hunters. Diminished breeding of the dogs with the white markings faced extinction by the end of the 19th century.

In the 1920s, a few Irish breeders set out to save the Irish Red and White, and after many years of hard work the breed was recognized and the American Kennel Club accepted it into the Sporting Breed in 2009.
