Why do dogs wag their tails?

Our dogs wag their tails because they are happy to see us. But what does it really mean - tails position, speed, and the direction.

In general, the higher the tail, and faster the wag, the greater the level of arousal. Low wagging often denotes fear and appeasement.

If you see a dog with a fast-wagging high tail, it does not always mean, "I am happy to see you". It can also mean "try to pet me and you are toast". Simple answer: body language. "Pet me" - soft eyes and open-mouth grin.

"Non-pet" - tense body and hard eyes.

Looking at a medium-height wag indicates a calmer, less-aroused dog - but then again, look at the whole body.

Circle tail wag - the favorite and wants to call you their friend.

Low wagging tail are likely to indicate fearful and defensive. Some dogs may roll over but do not attempt to engage. He may be pleading you to go away.

There can be a dog with a non-wagging tail which says, I am in "Zen", but it could also mean

As our dogs interact with other dogs, be sure to take note of the whole dog's body language. Let the dog come to you. Our dogs are talking to us all the time. Remember to listen with your
