Since many of our members have been involved in Reading to Dogs in schools and libraries, it has given us a wonderful opportunity to educate children in how to be good pet owners. When we teach our children in how to love and care for animals, we are teaching them to love and care for others too. We have shown them the proper way to pet a dog and how to protect themselves from a dangerous dog.

Studies have shown that children bond with an animal beginning about 12 months of age and is usually complete by the eighteenth month. Most young children believe that physical punishment is the only way to alter pet behavior, a belief young children quickly learn from observing their parents discipline their pets. As a note, we do encourage parents to wait until their children are older to introduce parents to wait until their children are older to introduce a pet into their home. Many times, the pet is already a part of the family when children come into the picture.

Humane education begins with our earliest experience with pain and suffering. Those who see pets as very different from themselves, however, do not readily accept the fact that pets have feelings and can feel pain. Many pet owners believe that physical violence is the only effective method of eliminating pet behavior.

Large numbers of pets are abandoned to the pound for easily remedied behavior problems. Owners learning and using effective training methods would have fewer problem pets and the number of pets sent to pounds would be reduced.

In our contact with school age children by teaching them humane behavior, such exposure could then pass on modeling behaviors to their peers. Even though studies show that children focus on the companionship of pet ownership, we have the opportunity with our pets to have them learn nutrition, cleanliness, exercise, health care, and the importance of discipline, respect and responsibility. It also helps them learn to be patient, caring and loving to all living creatures.

As we know from watching TV or reading our newspapers, there is a close correlation of animal abuse to child abuse and domestic violence.

### Old Friends (Continued)

Hospitable respect for animals or other people is an essential value for living well upon Earth. When it breaks down, the alternatives of violence, uncontrol, or other forms of power destroy our relationship.

In our Reading to the Dogs program we are ambassadors of education that can go along way in having children become more responsible pet owners as adults.

No better words can describe the dedication of military canines to their job as Scout, Sentry, Mine, Tunnel or Tracker, nor the loyalty to their military handler then those of the K-9 Promise:

My eyes are your eyes to watch and protect you and yours.  
My ears are your ears to hear and detect evil minds in the dark.  
My nose is your nose to scent the invader of your domain  
And so you may live, my life is also yours.

If you would like to show your appreciation for all the military canines do, please donate an item ONLY from the list below and ONLY the recommended size. These dogs are on a special diet, so items such as rawhides, pig ears, fancy treats will only have to be removed prior to shipping.

K9 Cooling Vests; K9 Cooling Mats; K9 Cooling Collar; K9Boots; Collapsible Nylon dog bowls; Kong 3" rubber ball; Large Rope Chews; K9 Shampoo and Conditioner; K9 Grooming tools (brushes, combs); K9 Jerky (beef, rice and/or vegetable), Dog beds or pillows; K9 toothpaste & brush; K9 Eye Drops; K9 Ear Wash; K9 Advantix Flea and Tic treatment; K9 salves for paws/noses; Milk bone dog biscuits (only 1 pound boxes); towels to wipe paws.

There is the possibility that some of the handlers may have or be interested in a breed of dog you own. If you choose, include an envelope with your clearly printed contact information, indicating your breed of dog. This information will be included in each box, and although there is no guarantee, you may hear back from one of the handlers to correspond about your breed.

## **Breed of the Month**

### **American Eskimo**

The American Eskimo, nicknamed “Eskie” was recognized by AKC in 1994 into its non-sporting group.

The breed’s intelligence keeps Eskie owners hooked. They are 100 percent loyal, always wanting to please you. A combination of beauty, intelligence and outgoing personality make American Eskimos a favored attraction with the circus.

Confusion remains over the breed’s name. Many people call them the little spitz dogs. The confusion comes from German immigrant who brought white German Spitz dogs to America during the 1800’s. When the United Kennel Club recognized the breed in 1913, it changed the name rather than arouse anti-German sentiment. The UKC named the breed after a renowned white spitz kennel – American Eskimo Kennel, hence it became known as the American Eskimo Dog.



Their sparkling white coat requires less care than you might think. The breed has no doggie odor, and they are very clean. They will lick their paws and wash their faces like a cat. Oil in their under layer of fur repels dirt. Most of this coat and the dog will shed minimally the remainder of the year.

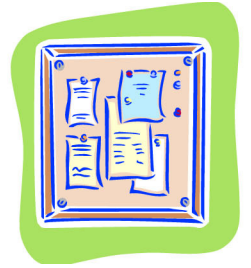
An intensely social dog, he bonds with its family. When picking a puppy sit on the ground at their level and let the puppy pick you. If you’re interested in a puppy that will be at your side every minute, wanting to do anything and everything it can to please you, this is the breed for you.

Unfortunately their barking and alertness give the breed a reputation for aggressiveness. It’s a working breed, they either want to be with you or they “need to be busy”. Positive reinforcement with a lot of praise works best in training this breed. Overtraining will result in either a passive dog that whimpers or an aggressive dog that bites.

American Eskimos reward their owners with loyalty. It’s an active bouncy breed. If you want a true companion, this is the breed for you. (Note: Marjean Krech’s dog Schotzie is an American Eskimo)
