## Old Friends

A large portion of those individuals who deal with the pet-owning public (veterinarians, breeders, trainers) still do not understand the function of the animal counselor.

In most cases the veterinarian is usually the first person to whom an owner turns when he begins to experience a behavioral problem in his dog. Most veterinarians may have some suggestions or they may direct him to a trainer.

As a trainer I try to convey to everyone that you must become the dog's leader, keeping in mind that an educated dog needs supervision, instruction and boundaries, knows what's expected of him and has few anxieties. We are instructing you about how to train your dog.

Even as dogs are not born perfect, we as trainers weren't born perfect. As training methods change and we constantly are learning, there are many approaches to obedience that never changes. Everyone should have a goal when training their dog. You should want your dog to have a healthy attitude when he comes to class and you should enjoy what you are doing. Some owners get hard on themselves and act like one mistake means the whole training session is ruined.

If your dog trusts you, that is at least half the battle in helping him learn. You will be surprised at how confident a dog becomes as he masters his skills, meets your expectations and receives praise and recognition.

Sometimes after consulting a veterinarian or a trainer further help is needed with problems you are experiencing, especially in the home environment. This is where the animal counselor comes into play. The first job for them is to help the owner understand the reasons and causes behind a behavioral problem. Occasionally owners think a counselor can "fix" a problem like one fixes a TV set. The most he can do is give the owner a prognosis based on the assessment of the facts.

Next, and most important, is motivating the owners to work with the dog between meetings they have with the counselor. All owners desire an abatement of the problem, however, some do not have the time or may find it impossible to compromise their lifestyle. Owners have to realize that for most cases they themselves have to serve as the agents of change.

Ray Ramos has participated in some of our training sessions and has been a great help with his suggestions to our members.

### Westminster Dog Show

February 9 and 10 are the dates for the world's most prestigious dog show, Westminster Kennel Club Dog Show, a national event like the Super Bowl.

If you aren't a New Yorker, it's likely you've never been any place this crowded. Think of the mall at Christmastime, make it 10 times more crammed and add more than 1,000 dogs each day.

Backstage in the benching area - where the dogs stay in crates when they're not in the ring - it is so tight at times no one can move. Only at Westminster would people hire guards to protect their dogs, at a price of \$300 a day. There are extremist animal-rights organizations who may try to "liberate" dogs, but the biggest concern is the dog-loving audience. Swarms of wee-meaning people want to touch, hug, and kiss the dogs. They'll poke at sleeping dogs or bark in a dog's face. At one show a woman crawled inside a Komondor's crate just to see what its coat felt like.

The dog-show faithful don't congregate only at the show; for them it's part dog show, convention, and family reunion. Days before the show they attend seminars, art shows, fun-raising events, meetings, award banquets and some of the best parties of the year.

This year David Fry said that 7 working TDI dogs will be honored at the show.

## Breed of the Month

### Greyhound

The athletic greyhound is the second fastest land animal on earth – only the Cheetah can outrun him. They like to exercise each other, and if you have more than one they will run circles or figure eights in your yard.

Many historians believe the Greyhound, depicted in Egyptian art as early as 3000 B.C., was among the first dog breeds to be selectively bred by humans. Ovid described the Greyhound in Rome around the time of Christ.

The Greyhound has been used on practically all kinds of small game, including deer, foxes, and so forth, but the hare is his natural quarry, and coursing is the sport with which he has been associated for centuries.



The Greyhound was brought to this country by Spanish explorers in the early 1500s to guard, hunt, intimidate and punish their enemies – in this case, the Indians.

They were among the earliest at American dog shows. The catalog of the first Westminster Kennel Club show in 1877 included an entry of 18 Greyhounds. In 1912, O.P. Smith invented the mechanical lure, and track racing for Greyhounds began. It is highly controversial, and many organizations have sprung up around the country to help place retired racing Greyhounds into pet homes. (Suzie, Barbara Minnick's Greyhound, was rescued from a track in Florida.)

Content to snooze the day away, they prefer soft surfaces, warm temperatures, and luxurious accommodations, living up to their reputation as being “couch potatoes”.

Quiet and polite, the Greyhound may seem easy to train. Think again. They aren't bred to do what you want, they are bred to think for themselves. Gentle, reward-based methods work best for the sensitive Greyhound.

Potential adopters should screen rescue organizations by asking questions such as a personality profile, return policy, a provision of basic health care, including “spay or neuter”, teeth cleaning, shots, working and a tick titer test.

Whether you love the breed because of its sweet temperament, elegant lines, or quiet ways, owning a Greyhound can be a deeply satisfying experience – for your senses and your heart.

(Ironically, one of the great show dogs of the year, a Pointer named Holly, is ineligible for the Show since she is owned by a member of the Westminster Kennel Club.)

To return to UNO's world, David Frei UNO's escort over the past year revealed that UNO had his own ticket on the plane and sat in an adjoining seat. UNO and Frei visited Ronald MacDonal Houses all over the country (Also, UNO did meet Cesar Millan). UNO will make an appearance during the Show with a friend, a double amputee, he met while visiting Walter Reed hospital. Frei says James, the 2007 winning English Springer Spaniel was probably the best therapy dog he ever worked with and that Westminster champions prove that Westminster is about real dogs.

I had to ask David Frei why he picked the Portugese Water Dog as the breed the Obamas should adopt from a rescue or shelter. After all, the Obamas are first time dog owners. The answer--predictability, hyperallergenic, gregarious, a breed noted for its health, bravery, and dedication to family members. Labradoodles are not hyperallergenic, Frei says, and warns it may even be a federal crime to lie to the president!

Frei has a superbowl ring (Denver Broncos, San Francisco 49ers and ABC TV Sports) but says his heart now is in the world of dogs especially therapy dogs. "It isn't what we teach our dogs, but what we learn from them, that is important," he stresses. "Therapy dogs are about the moment," Frei says and tells a story of 10 minutes of clarity with an Alzheimer victim when he visited the man with his own Brittany, Belle. And, he added the moment can be an hour with a child who will die in three days from cancer.

The Westminster Kennel Club airs on the USA channel February 9th and 10th.

There's a searchable database on the FDA's web site to look up anything that may have been recalled, but it's best to NOT eat anything you have in your pantry that has peanut butter in it, like peanut butter crackers especially. Your JARS OF PEANUT BUTTER are SAFE! And PetSmart is voluntarily recalling seven of its Great Choice Dog Biscuit products that contain peanut paste made by Peanut Corporation of America (PCA). Customers who purchased the recalled dog biscuit products should discontinue use immediately and can return the product to any PetSmart store for a complete refund or exchange. This looks like it may be the biggest recall of peanut butter containing products in history. Watch the news, the FDA web site, and the CDC web site: <http://www.cdc.gov/salmonella/typhimurium>. If you fed your dogs or cats any peanut butter containing products, and they start to get bloody diarrhea or stool with a lot of mucus, call your vet right away. Most will get over it but others might require antibiotics. Dispose of the stool properly as Salmonella can shed from up to 30 days to a year!


